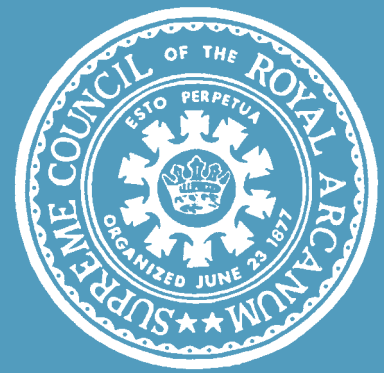


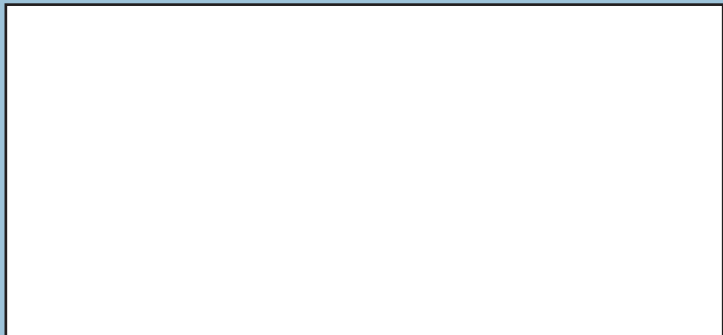

COUNCIL CELEBRATES “LE MOIS DE LA FRANCOPHONIE”

Lowell Council No. 23 Celebrates “le mois de la Francophonie”.

Did you know that March is designated as the Month of the Francophonie? Each year, the diversity of the French language is celebrated by the 70 governments and states recognized as members of the International Organization of the Francophonie (IOF). The month of March was chosen in commemoration of the founding of the IOF in 1970 which was signed in Niger. This treaty established a unified community between all French-speaking nations in the world.

“What does Francophonie mean?” you might ask.

A Francophonie is somebody who speaks French and in this context “la Francophonie” means a person who is from a country that speaks French.

During this past March, the Lowell Council celebrated this event by visiting a French Class at the St-

The five interconnected segments represent the idea of cooperation across the five continents where the members of La Francophonie are located. The five colors represent the various colors found on the flags of the participating countries and governments. 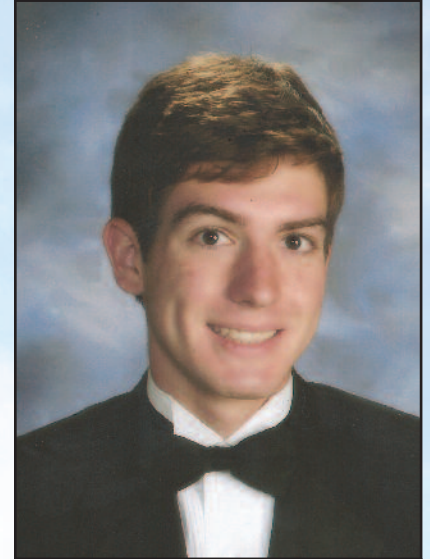

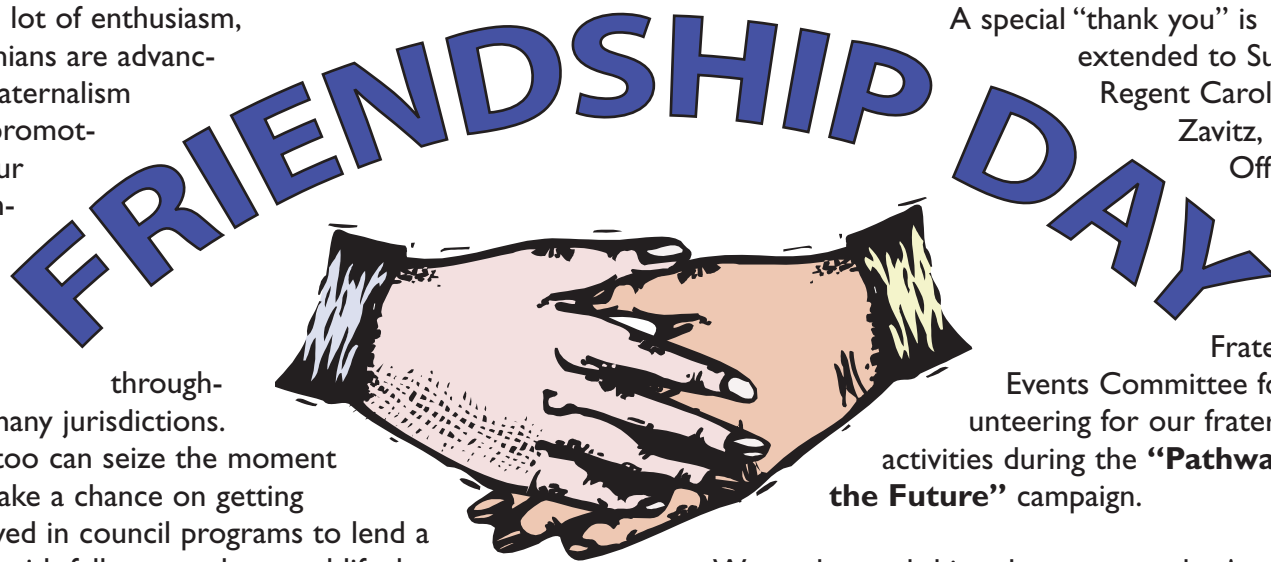

The first hurricane of the 2012 season, Alberto, arrived the last week of May, a week earlier than it should have. Technically, the Atlantic Hurricane Season does not begin until June 1st, and ends on November 30th. However, there is nothing magical in those dates, as hurricanes have been known to come at other times. Alberto was only the third hurricane to form before June 1st in the past 31 years. This year Beryl was quick to follow Alberto, but normally most hurricanes occur in the Fall season.

One would notice that Alberto is a traditionally male name and Beryl female. What about the naming of these hurricanes anyway? Atlantic hurricanes have been named since 1950, the very first being named Able, but the first one given a real human name was Alice in 1953. The practice of naming the hurricanes after women only continued until 1979, with the appearance of hurricane Bob, the first to be given a conventionally male name.

The hurricanes are named in alphabetical order by the World Meteorological Organization, and are sub-

ject to being changed by that organization. The names, both male and female, have been selected for as far into the future as 2025, usually alternating six different name lists. The names selected for 2012 are Alberto, Beryl, Chris, Debbie, Ernesto, Florence, Gordon, Helene, Isaac, Joyce, Kirk, Leslie, Michael, Nadine, Oscar, Patty, Rafael, Sandy, Tony, Valerie, and William. Yes, five letters of our alphabet have been omitted, and you, Reader, are invited to figure out which ones and why.

except for its geography or location, is a powerful storm system with a low pressure center producing intense winds and heavy rainfall. Hurricanes form in warm tropical oceans that are 80 degrees F (26.5 C) or higher, when winds come together and move upward, forcing the upper winds to flow outward. Light winds steer them and make them grow. They can be up to 600 miles in width, have a lot of moisture, and can move at a speed of 75 to 200 miles per hour.

Most hurricanes rage harmlessly in the sea, but when they make landfall, they can wreak havoc and cause billions of dollars worth of damage with their dangerous winds and severe flooding, not to mention the lives that hurricanes



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The most hurricanes in any one season was in 2005, and the fewest in 1965, when there were only four.

The hurricane, which is the same as a typhoon

have claimed. By the way, there are Hurricane Hunters under the auspices of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration who fly four to six times through a hurricane, with very sophisticated technical equipment recording data.

Hurricanes should not be taken lightly, and those who are in their usual paths should be prepared, develop a hurricane plan and emergency kit, and know whether, when, and where to evacuate. Those who do not evacuate should stay indoors and avoid standing water that could be electrically charged. Homes should be boarded up and outside furniture and belongings secured. We need to always remember that there is no such thing as a minor hurricane.

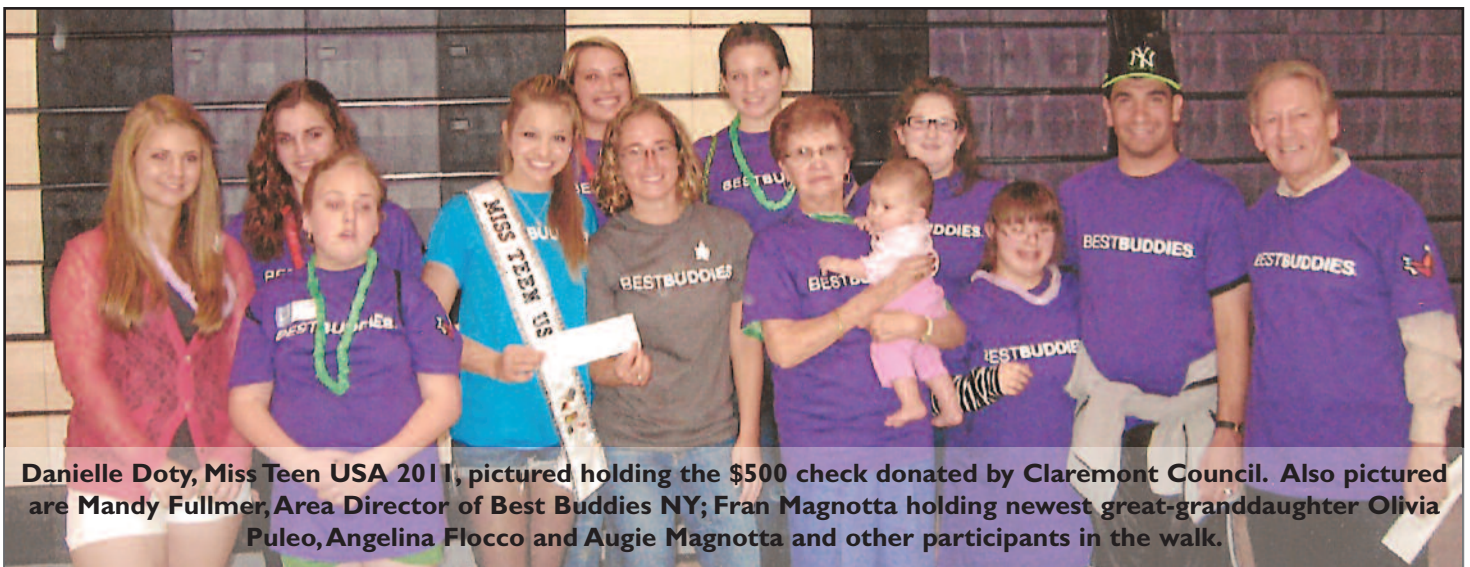

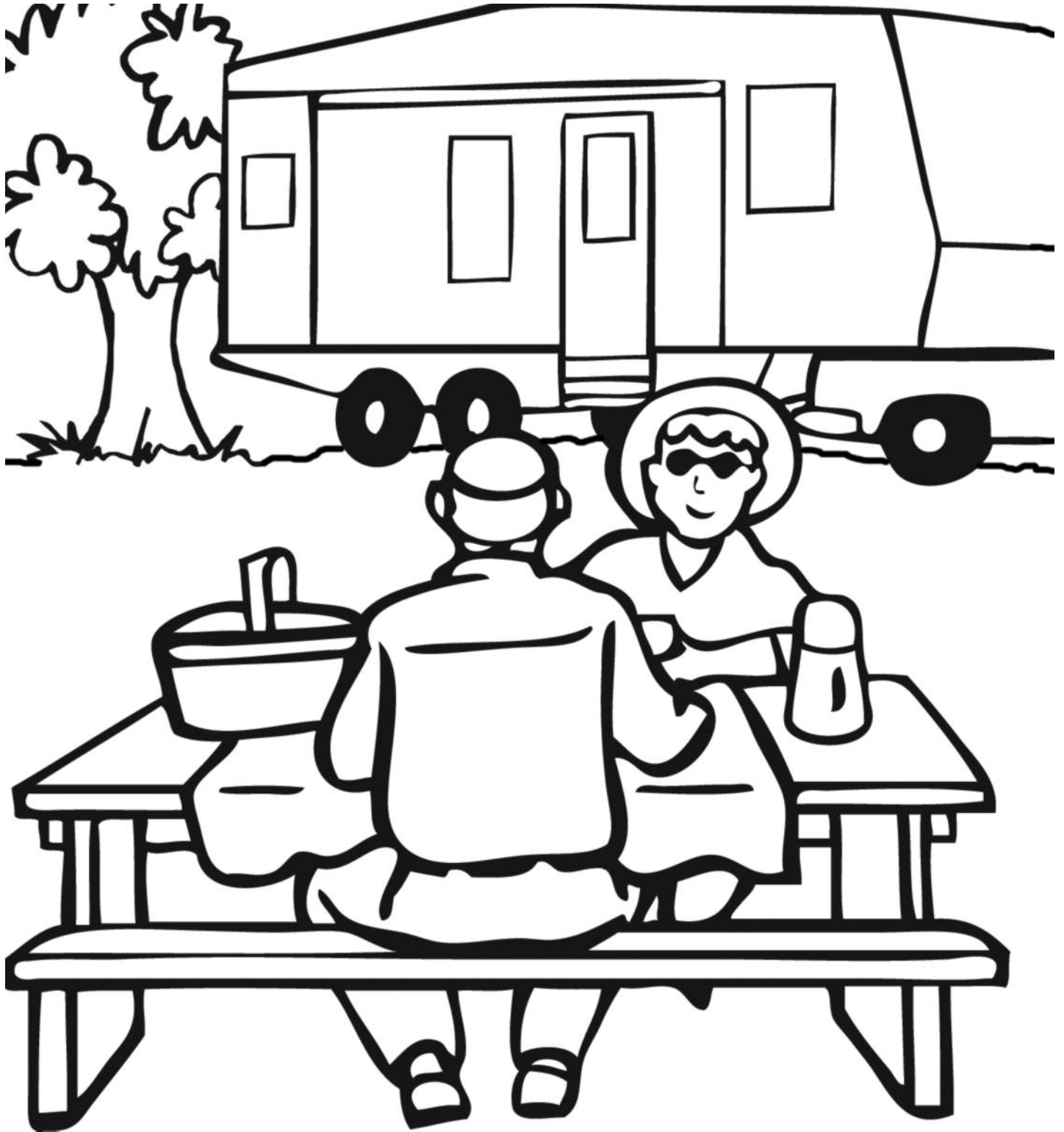

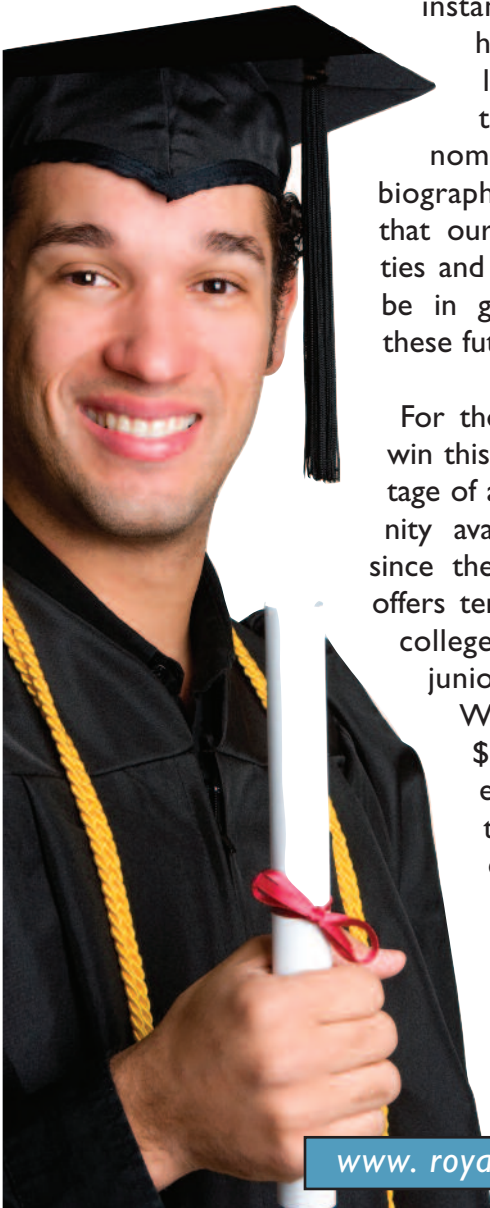
