Lastly, three of Medora's members attended the fund-raiser event, providing even more support and further solidifying the partnership.

The connection between the Royal Arcanum and HHH is less than a year old, but provides a model for our councils to stay engaged in their communities, and to get the word out about all the benefits our society offers.

Grand Regent Maria DiBartolo rallied support of the New York Arcanians to aid a 4-year old boy, Gabriel Golaj, after learning of the physical challenges that he faced. Now residing in the Bronx, Gabriel was born in Albania with a congenital birth defect of a lower limb reduction of his right leg which would significantly hamper his mobility as he grew. After several hospital stays and medical appointments, a corrective procedure in May, 2015 resulted in the amputation of his right leg at the knee. Today he can now walk, but will have a long road ahead with continued rehabilitation and the need for several new prosthetics as he grows.





• Use privacy controls. Limit what's available on your profile so strangers don't have complete access to everything you post online.

• Keep vacations quiet. Don't announce that you're going to be out of town ahead of time. You don't want to advertise that your home will be empty.

MONEY MATTERS

Save money on groceries

You've got to buy food, but you don't have to spend wildly on it.

Smart shopping can save you a bundle. If you save just \$20 a month on groceries, you've banked more than \$200 over the year. Here are some strategies to save on your food bill:

• Cut back on convenience foods.

Don't buy things like packaged salads or precut celery. You're paying extra money for a small convenience.

- Check out different stores. You may find as much as a 10-15 percent difference on identical products at different stores, depending on the

I was pleased to be able to join the Massachusetts and Rhode Island Grand Councils for the 2nd annual joint event at the Pawtucket Red Sox game on June I I th. The game was exciting and we had nearly 40 members attend the event to benefit the Cradles to Crayons charity. The ice cream bars served at the game certainly were refreshing, as we faced some hot and humid weather that day. Everyone enjoyed an open BBQ buffet prior to the game and I can surely say it was a blast for all ages!



We have experienced a high level of Life Insurance production throughout the year, which has created a very busy office for us in Boston, Massachusetts. The many operational changes made in the office, however, have paid dividends, allowing our staff to maintain the expected turn-around times and still provide the best possible service to our members. We strive to furnish exceptional service in all departments with the most efficient response times; that truly distinguishes us from large insurance companies.

There is a resolution in the House of Representatives, HCR-10, to maintain the current fraternal society tax exemption status and it has been sponsored by over 50 House Representatives. Also, for the first time a bill has been introduced in the Senate, SCR 7, that has gained nearly 15 Senators' sponsorship thus far. This tax exemption allows us to create and maintain several of our fraternal programs and member benefits.

We also have a bill in the Massachusetts State House Legislation, H-3661, that would allow fraternal benefit societies domiciled in the state of Massachusetts to invest up to 50% of surplus in the market, rather than the current law that restricts ability to invest greater than 25% of surplus in the market. By limiting investments to the bond market, the ability to



increase investment returns is restricted. If you're willing to write a letter in support of either bill mentioned above, please let me know, as I'm more than willing to assist and provide the specific details. There truly is a power in numbers.

It seems as though everyone always says that time goes by too fast, and I agree. As I look back when I was a youngster, everyone would say "Enjoy being young". When I was in college earning my degree, I would hear "Enjoy these years as they will go by too fast". They certainly did go by fast, which is good reason why we need to enjoy every day, as each new day is a blessing. It's certainly a challenge to balance the work/life schedule; however I've learned it's vital to strive to give I00% on both sides and appreciate each day, whether in the office or at home with loved ones. Be mindful of helping someone less fortunate each day. Whether it's allowing another driver to merge into your lane in traffic or by helping someone in need, such a kind gesture could mean the world to someone.

rooms, and 44 skilled-nursing-care private rooms. No one is turned down for lack of money, only for lack of space.

Integrity Council members brought toiletries, paper supplies, and other incidentals to assist with the work at Holy Family Home. The Council also made a contribution of \$500.00 to support the benevolent work the Sisters are doing. The Sisters and Arcanians thanked Regent Rosanne Koslow for arranging the most worthwhile meeting.

The Mother House for "The Little Sisters of the Poor" is in France, where in 1839 the now Saint Jeanne Jugan, moved by the plight of a sick and poverty-stricken old woman, brought her into her own apartment, cleaned her up and dressed her wounds, and actually gave up her own bed for the sick woman. Soon her apartment was filled with similar persons, and "The Little Sisters of the Poor" were formed.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

Be careful with sugar intake.

A spoonful of sugar may, as Mary Poppins sang, help the medicine go down. But too many spoonfuls will probably increase your need to take medicine in the first place.

Too much sugar—or rather, the unproductive calories it delivers to the body—can lead to weight gain,

diabetes, and heart disease, among other health problems.

How much is too much? An American Heart Association study found that Americans consume an average of 22



teaspoons a day (at least during the period of 2001-2004). AHA guidelines recommend much less: six teaspoons a day for women, and nine teaspoons for men.

Check the labels of the foods you're eating: a lot of sugar can be found in most processed foods. And don't rely on sugar substitutes like high-fructose corn syrup. Though fructose may have

less impact on the body's blood sugar and insulin levels, a calorie of fructose has the same impact as a calorie of sugar. As in most things, moderation is key.





I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate our scholarship winners as listed in the Bulletin. I would like to extend congratulations to all Juniors who submitted applications; it was a very competitive field of applicants. It bodes well for our organization that our Juniors displayed such impressive resumes, as these are the future leaders of the Royal Arcanum.

This year the Royal Arcanum awarded over \$68,000 in scholarships and grants based on membership and merit. The scholarship program is a competitive process, with an outside judge rating all the applications and determining the winners. Through a random drawing,

our Society awarded five \$600 grants to applicants who did not win a scholarship. As part of our College and Career Planning Program, we offer four \$500 career training awards for adults and ten \$250 grants for college sophomores, juniors and seniors. Application forms for all our scholarships and grant programs can be found on our website, www.royalarcanum.com. All Junior members, ages 18 and under who take a SAT, ACT, PSAT or LSAT training course/program are eligible for a \$50 reimbursement. Members should mail the paid receipt to the Home Office in Boston for payment.

Since its inception, the Royal Arcanum Scholarship program has awarded over a million dollars in scholarships. This is a tribute to our membership and the



value that is placed in seeing that our Juniors' education needs are a priority for our Organization. In addition to our scholarship and grant programs, the Royal Arcanum offers many educational loan programs to offset the increasing costs of a college education. With membership, Juniors may be eligible for undergraduate loans of up to \$10,000. We also offer graduate education loans up to \$4000. Complete details of all our educational loan programs, policy offerings, and annuities can be found on our web page or by contacting the Home Office.
