


RHODODENDRON FRATERNAL PROJECT







to hear about the Supreme Regent's "Keeping on Track" Program.








There are other tools that are being used behind the scenes to deliver better customer service to those interested in our products line of annuities and life insurance.

Section 19 (1), 20, and 21 of the Constitution

The offices, including the committees, shall remain the same.

By July 15 of the year of the Supreme Council Session, the Chairperson of the Supreme Council Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee on Nominations consisting of four Supreme Council Session members (current or past), representing the diversity of our Order, plus the Supreme Regent, who will serve as chairperson for the purpose of developing a slate of officers for the ensuing Supreme Council Session. It is suggested that an announcement of this appointed committee and the nominations procedure be included in the "CALL" to the Session and in the Spring Edition of the Bulletin.

At the REGISTRATION DESK on OPENING DAY of the Supreme Council Session a list of the Nominations will be distributed to the representatives. It is recommended that a brief bio of not more than 75 words for each nominee be included.

On THE SECOND DAY of the Supreme Council Session additional nominations may be made from the floor. All those being nominated shall have been contacted by the member making the nomination in order to insure that those being nominated are willing to have their names on the slate. A bio on each nominee of not more than 75 words would be helpful. (A resolution will be presented at the beginning calling for nominations on the second day).

On THE THIRD DAY of the Supreme Council Session, printed ballots including the names of all nominees shall be distributed. In the case of the Line Officers and the Executive Committee, there must be individual ballots (unless the Constitution is changed), but the other committees may be elected on one ballot. Additional nominations will not be entertained at this time. Delegates will cast their votes, which will be counted by the two appointed tellers and the Judge of Elections, who will count the votes. (A resolution will be presented at the beginning to nominate and elect all Committeepersons and Trustees, collectively unless there is a contested election. In the case of the two Finance Committee Members, Supreme Trustees, Committee on Juniors and Committee on Appeals, if there are more than four nominees, the four receiving the highest vote will be declared winners).

THE NOMINEE with the majority of votes based on our established ratio between delegates and officers, shall win the election to his or her respective office. In the case of the committees, the required members for each committee with the highest number of votes shall be elected (the four Supreme Trustees, the three members of the Committee on Laws, the two additional members of the Finance Committee, the four members of the Committee on Juniors, and the four members of the Committee on Appeals).

“Bonjour! Comment allez-vous?” From the time I was a child, my mother insisted that my siblings and I memorize the basics of polite French phrases. She is part of a generation which, like many before it, learned that French was a lingua franca – a language that one needed to speak to “get by” almost anywhere in the world. That remains true, as nearly 300 million people in the world speak French as their first or second language. An official language in 29 countries and the United Nations, it is still a great choice for striking up a conversation with a stranger almost anywhere in the world.

“Hello! How are you?” Yes, English is my first language, so I’ve learned and used it throughout my life. In the early twenty-first century, English has also become a lingua franca, as 380 million people speak it as their first or second language. No matter where I travel, I can find someone who speaks English (especially if they are under 30 years of age).


In our Royal Arcanum family, French and English are both official languages. We have many members in the Province of Quebec, and French is one of the official languages of Canada. Most of our materials, especially relating to production and other official business, must be available in both languages. Wherever we go as a Society, our languages will both be heard in restaurants, meeting rooms, and hotel hallways.

I count French as my fourth language, so I thought that it would be fun to reflect on our two languages for our Bulletin. I hope that you’ll enjoy this time of thinking about our two languages!

Many people forget how influential French has been on the development of English over the centuries. Even before William II (“The Conqueror”), Duke of Normandy, became King William I of England in 1066, there were Normans living in southern England. As a result of the Battle of Hastings, it suddenly became stylish to speak Norman French, and that became the language of the

aristocracy for generations. As a result, many “sophisticated” words derived from French replaced the common or “vulgar”

English equivalents (derived mostly from Anglo-Saxon). This is seen most clearly in our English names for animals and the food that comes from them: we raise steer, and we eat beef (*boeuf*); we raise swine and eat pork (*porc*); sheep are animals, but their meat is mutton (*mouton*); deer run wild, but they become venison (*venesoun*) on the dinner plate.



Since France and England are separated only by the English Channel, which is some 20 miles wide at its narrowest, there has been much interaction between the two cultures throughout history. The influence of French language on English continues today (interestingly enough with French heavily influencing English “upper-class culture” and cuisine [yet another word derived from French]). Where would English be without *café*, *restaurant*, *pistol*, *squadron*, *terrace*, *pavilion*, ... and on and on? Some experts estimate that 30% of English comes from French, and that some 80,000 words could be included on this list!

English is the “younger” language, so words didn’t start moving “the other direction” until more modern times. Today we hear or read “jeans,” “lawn-tennis,” “sport,” “trade-union,” all imported directly from English into French. One might even read the sentences, “*Un meeting a cu lieu au Skating-Rink. Les leaders des Trade-Unions ont explique au personnel lock-out la cause du conflit,*” and almost wonder if it was in a French news report or in an English newspaper!

Thanks for spending a few minutes thinking about our two wonderful languages with me! The next time that you’re with someone who is fluent in “the other” language of our Society, sit, and listen. Sit in admiration of how beautiful each language is...and you’ll probably hear a word or two here or there that you recognize!



INTEGRITY COUNCIL FRATERNAL PROJECT







As you can imagine, these coins are very scarce and are highly valuable today. There are two mint museums in Charlotte, one in the Randolph section and one in the Levin Center for the Arts in Center City. Both of these museums offer exhibits and a theater featuring lectures and performances.


