

The Royal Arcanum wishes Jane an abundance of happiness, wonder and health for this special milestone and Into the Future!



BALTIMORE CALLING!

The 106th Supreme Council Session will be conducted in scenic Baltimore, Maryland from July 28 through July 31, 2024. The area at the Inner Harbor offers many activities for families and the surrounding area provides a variety of great opportunities for summer visitors.

First, a look back to some of the city's history. During the American Revolutionary War, the Second Continental Congress moved deliberations to Henry Fite House from December 1776 to February 1777, permitting Baltimore to serve briefly as the nation's capital before the capital returned to Independence Hall in Philadelphia in March 1777. In the mid-18th century, the first printing press and newspapers were introduced to Baltimore.

During the War of 1812, the Battle of Baltimore was a pivotal engagement, culminating in the failed British

Baltimore may be the last place in the country where one can still find vendors who sell fresh fruits and vegetables from a horse-drawn cart that goes up and down neighborhood streets.

The city is especially known for its blue crabs and crab cakes. Visitors can enjoy a dinner cruise to see the sights, or try a Chinese Dragon paddleboat or ride an electric Pirate Ship for some added fun!

The Maryland Science Center contains a massive collection of dinosaur replicas and the Davis Planetarium offers a grand experience to "see the stars." Visitors can learn of the contributions of African Americans to Baltimore's shipbuilding industry at the Frederick Douglass-Isaac Myers Maritime Park. Students of literature and those who love to read can follow in Edgar Allan Poe's footsteps by visiting his one-time home, his



bombardment of Fort McHenry. At this time Francis Scott Key wrote a poem that would become 'The Star-Spangled Banner'; the American national anthem since 1931. Fort McHenry is now a museum and public park.

The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, the nation's oldest railroad, cemented Baltimore's status as a major transportation hub, and the Inner Harbor was once the second leading port of entry for immigrants to the United States.

The city's history and attractions have made Baltimore a popular tourist destination. The National Aquarium showcases sealife of all sorts. Baltimore Harbor's restoration has made it a "city of boats", with several historic ships on display and open to the public; these include the USS Constellation, the USS Torsk, and the Coast Guard cutter WHEC-37 (the last surviving U.S. warship that was in Pearl Harbor during the attack on December 7, 1941).

Three floors of adventure await at the Port Discovery Children's Museum, and The Maryland Zoo houses an award-winning Penguin Coast exhibit that's sure to delight.

For baseball enthusiasts, cheering on the home team, The Orioles (or their challengers, if you prefer) is a fun experience at Camden Yards.

IRISH SODA BREAD

We hope you enjoy this recipe shared by Past Supreme Regent Errica Conforto. Irish soda bread is traditionally baked for St. Patrick's Day. Unlike regular yeast bread, this one has no rising time, and once the dough comes together, it is ready to be baked.

Ingredients:

4 cups flour
I tsp. baking soda
I/2 tsp. baking powder
I tsp. salt
4 tbsp. sugar
4 tbsp. cold butter
zest of one orange
I cup dried cranberries or raisins
I egg
I 2/3 cup of buttermilk

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

In a large bowl, mix together flour, baking soda, baking powder, salt, and sugar. Whisk well; add cut

cold butter into small pieces and use your fingers to work the butter into the flour until fine crumbs form. Stir in cranberries and the orange zest.

In a large measuring cup, whisk buttermilk and egg and add to the flour mixture. Use a wooden spoon and mix just until lightly moist and dough starts to come together.

Transfer to floured surface and use your hands to shape dough into a round loaf. Flour your hands to prevent sticking. Do not over mix.

Transfer dough loaf to a buttered pan or a parchment paper-lined pan. Use a knife to score an X on the top.

Bake at 375 degrees for 50-55 minutes or until golden brown.

Remove pan from oven and transfer to wire rack to cool.

As we anxiously await the arrival of spring, many of us are already planning to pack up the snow boots, clean the shovels and ice scrapers, and store the buckets of ice melt. Hopefully there won't be any snowstorms for us in the near future!

While making room for the winter supplies in the basement or garage, you might want to take some time to remove the tarp and dust off the bicycles. Taking a bike ride when the spring sun is shining and there's a gentle breeze in the air can be a refreshing activity to greet the new season!

Did you know that the tandem bicycle (designed to be ridden by more than one person) was created in 1898?

The term 'tandem' refers to the seating arrangement (fore to aft). A twin version (or two-seater) is sometimes called "Daisy Bell". This name originated from the song, Bicycle Built for Two that was composed by British songwriter Harry Dacre. Interestingly, the two-seater model was invented in an effort to make bicycling faster and it was often used by soldiers. Historically, bicycles in the military lessened the need for horses, fuel and vehicle maintenance.

Bike riding can be a pleasurable form of exercise and relaxation. There are also competitive styles such as the Tour de France for serious, trained contenders. To have fun and see the sights is a great motivator, and bike riding with a friend in your neighborhood or when vacationing in a new locale can be a rewarding experience. It's good to have a buddy, whether you're peddling on a single or tandem bike, down the narrow alleys and up the lofty hills.

Although there's rarely an opportunity for us to bike ride together, Royal Arcanum members across the Supreme Council are enthusiastic buddies, year-long. The recently introduced "Buddy Project" has had a tremendous start in our councils. We look forward to making this a banner year for the Supreme Regent's *Into the Future* Program. Buddies are interacting with members in other jurisdictions and sharing ideas, making plans, and conducting volunteer activities. Together, we're sharing the spirit of Royal Arcanum fraternalism in communities, near and far!

We often rely on our buddies to lift our spirit or when we need a helping hand or an ear to listen. NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS OF OFFICERS

Section 19(1), 20 and 21 of the Constitution

The offices, including the committees, shall remain the same.

Forty-five (45) days prior to the start of the Supreme Council Session, the Chairperson of the Supreme Council Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee on Nominations consisting of four Supreme Council Session members (current or past), representing the diversity of our Order, plus the Supreme Regent, who will serve as chairperson for the purpose of developing a slate of officers for the ensuing Supreme Council Session. It is suggested that an announcement of this appointed committee and the nominations procedure be included in the "CALL" to the Session and in the Spring Edition of the Bulletin.

The nomination committee report will be presented at the Executive Committee meeting prior to the Session. At the Registration Desk on Opening Day of the Supreme Council Session, a list of the Nominations will be distributed to the representatives. It is recommended that a brief bio for each nominee be included. For positions that will serve on the Executive Committee, it is recommended that the bio contain relevant information such as qualifications, aspirations for office, their Royal Arcanum history, etc.

At the Supreme Council Session, additional nominations may be made from the floor. All those being nominated shall have been contacted by the member making the nomination in order to insure that those being nominated are willing to have their names on the slate. A bio on each nominee would be helpful. (A resolution will be presented calling for nominations).

For the election of officers, printed ballots including the names of all nominees shall be distributed. In the case of Line Officers and the Executive Committee, there must be individual ballots (unless the Constitution is changed), but the other committees may be elected on one ballot. Additional nominations will not be entertained at this time. Delegates and Officers will cast their votes, which will be counted by the two appointed tellers and the Judge of Elections, who will count the votes. (A resolution will be presented at the beginning to nominate and elect all Committeepersons and Trustees, collectively, unless there is a contested election. In the case of the two Finance Committee Members, Supreme Trustees, Committee on Juniors and Committee on Appeals, if there are more than four nominees, the four receiving the highest vote will be declared winners).

The NOMINEE with the majority of votes based on the Order's established ratio between delegates and officers shall win the election to his or her respective office. In the case of the committees, the required members for each committee with the highest number of votes shall be elected (the four Trustees, the three members of the Committee on Laws, the two additional members of the Finance Committee, the four members of the Committee on Juniors, and the four members of the Committee on Appeals).


Graceway Village is a 501(c) (3) charity in the Fort Pierce, Florida area that helps underserved and underprivileged families. Its

CHIEF OPERATIONS OFFICER CORNER

We experienced exceptional growth in 2023, seeing a significant increase in life insurance production. Our application volume increased by over 25% compared to 2022. According to MIB, Inc. United States life insurance application activity finished 2023 for growth with year-to-date (YTD) activity up +2.9% compared with 2022. When taking a historical lookback, total activity YTD for 2023 was down -2.8% compared to 2021. Our significant increase in production was attributed to the result of many operational initiatives, along with partnerships with several new distribution channels. Significant strides were made to enhance the application experience, making the process more efficient for the application.

This summer we will hold the Royal Arcanum's 106th Supreme Council Session in Baltimore, Maryland. The

Hyatt venue and its spectacular location near the harbor will provide a wonderful atmosphere for our activities. I look forward to seeing many of our members from July 28th through the 31st at the Session. We'll reconnect. build on successful

fraternal programs, and learn of new opportunities that await.

I was pleased to learn of the many council activities that were sponsored last year. Financial contributions, the donation of goods and services - including support for food drives and other charities - and hosting celebrations and special events are a highlight of our Society's service to members and to communities.

I encourage members to make 2024 a year of involvement. Become more involved with your local council for developing new programs, attending council events, or contributing articles about council work to the Bulletin.

I envision a future for Royal Arcanum to grow, increasing membership and the impact we have across all communities. This objective will require a significant effort by all councils. If you were involved in one activity




Congratulations to all of our high school seniors who have applied for our Royal Arcanum scholarships and grants. Each applicant should have received a confirmation of their application





high school closed unexpectedly after her freshman year, attending a new school brought new opportunities and new challenges and she has excelled!






