THE THANKSGIVING MEAL

A typical Thanksgiving meal in the United States is a festive and hearty feast enjoyed by families and friends on the fourth Thursday of November. While the specific dishes may vary from one household to another, some traditional elements of a Thanksgiving meal include:

BAKER'S BOX: STRUFFOLI

Past Supreme Regent Errica Conforto shares this special holiday recipe for all to enjoy! Struffoli or honey balls is a classic Italian dessert made during Christmastime. Tiny balls of dough are fried until golden-brown, tossed in a sweet honey syrup and then decorated with rainbow sprinkles.

DOUGH:

2 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting
3 Tbsp. granulated sugar
½ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. baking power
3 large eggs
2 Tbsp. soft butter
I grated lemon
I grated orange
I tsp. vanilla extract
2-3 cups vegetable oil for deep-frying

FOR ASSEMBLY:

³/₄ to 1 cup honey Sugar sprinkles

MAKE THE DOUGH:

Mix all the ingredients together (by hand or food processor fitted with the blade attachment); form into a ball, then wrap in a plastic wrap and refrigerate for 30 minutes.

Dust a work surface with flour. Cut the dough in pieces. Roll each piece in a rope that's 10-12 inches long. Cut the rope into small pieces. Repeat with the remaining dough.

Heat 2-3 cups of vegetable oil in a medium-heavy saucepan to 350 F. When the oil is ready, fry dough pieces in 4-5 batches, stirring a few times, until golden brown all over. Remove the dough balls and transfer to paper towels.

MAKE THE HONEY SYRUP AND ASSEMBLE: Place the honey in a large skillet over medium heat and stir until the honey starts to bubble. Toss in the fried dough balls; mix to coat and remove from heat.

Using a big spoon, stack the struffoli on a plate or cake stand and decorate with sprinkles. Let sit for 15-20 minutes and serve. Enjoy!







Fraternal Director Cindy Macon had the opportunity to travel to Poland in September and spend some time with the Felician Sisters who have been welcoming Ukrainian "guests" in Warsaw and Krakow. It was a heartwarming experience to witness all the good that the sisters have been doing, especially for mothers and their children while the Russian war in Ukraine continues, and to see firsthand how the monetary donations and bounty of useful new gifts that the Royal Arcanum family has been contributing directly help those in

faces are true indicators that they feel safe and secure.

The efforts of the sisters, as well as those of host families, have been constant. When Ukraine was first invaded, people fled with barely a small bag of belongings, leaving behind loved ones and plagued with the uncertainty if they would ever have a future in their homeland. During her stay, the Fraternal Director learned of the toll that the war had also taken on the sick. Patients arrived in Poland with no medical records and with little

need. The sisters have again expressed their most sincere appreciation to the Royal Arcanum for the outpouring of support they have received from the Ukraine charitable projects for which they have been the beneficiaries.

Although some children are easily shaken at the sound of a siren or loud noise, they are resilient as they go about their studies or playtime. Their smiling

medication. Overcoming the language barrier with the voluntary assistance of students. interpreters, physicians, and other medical personnel, the sisters endeavored to begin a hospice so that those in need of chemotherapy or other treatments could be evaluated and have a medical plan initiated for

them. These labors have been beneficial for the patients who range in age from children through senior years. Their work will continue in the months ahead.

Thank you to the many councils, members, families, and friends for supporting the Royal Arcanum's fraternal-charitable program for Ukraine. It is a fervent hope that international and lasting peace will soon be a reality for all.

In 1950, "Choo-Choo Charlie", a cartoon character who pretended to be a railroad engineer, would often be featured in Good & Plenty television commercials. He'd

shake a box of the candy in his hand in a circular motion, imitating a train's pushrods and making a sound like a train while a toe-tapping jingle played.

Since 1996, Hershey Foods has manufactured Good & Plenty and to this day, the candy remains a tasty and popular pick for consumers year 'round. Upon seeing a family sharing a box of Good & Plenty at a checkout counter recently, Royal Arcanum quickly came to my mind. That's because as a family fraternal






MEDORA COUNCIL DONATES







COOK'S NOOK: STUFFED MUSHROOMS

This is a family favorite side dish recipe shared by Past Supreme Regent Errica Conforto. It may be a welcome addition to your holiday table and enjoyed by family and friends.

12 large mushrooms
1/4 cup olive oil
1 medium onion, chopped
2 cloves garlic, chopped
3 Tbsp. chopped parsley
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 slices bread, soaked in water & squeezed dry
1 egg
1/2 cup grated Romano cheese
2-3 tsp. bread crumbs

Cut off stems from mushrooms and wash very well. Chop the stems and cook in olive oil with onion and garlic for 5-7 minutes. Add parsley, salt, and pepper; cook for 5 minutes longer over a brisk flame.

Remove from stove. Add bread, egg, and cheese; mix together until smooth.

Fill each mushroom cap with stuffing, rounding stuffing up on top.

Sprinkle each with bread crumbs and a few drops of olive oil.

Arrange on a greased baking dish and bake in oven at 400 degrees for 20 - 30 minutes.
