

### Helping Neighbors in Need during the Pandemic


On any given Sunday evening you will find as many as 175 people lined up on the sidewalk in front of the Arch Street United Methodist Church in Philadelphia to receive a hot meal, to get personal items, and/or to visit with a nurse. These are the ways that the church's Grace Cafe ministry to homeless persons has evolved as a result of the pandemic.

Grace Cafe has been a recipient of hands-on volunteerism and charitable donations from Integrity Council #586, a grant from the Lorraine J.

D'Emilio Foundation, and an award from the Supreme Council's Hands-on Fraternalism program. The program has been in operation for more than ten years, and Integrity Council has actively volunteered almost every year of its existence.

Prior to the pandemic, guests would arrive on a Sunday evening and sit around tables in the church's fellowship hall to enjoy a hot meal prepared by a group of volunteers. Integrity Council is known for its meals of baked ziti, salad, bread & butter, and cookies. Volunteers would also serve the food, providing a restaurant-like experience. For the past three years, a group of nurses have also volunteered to provide a Wellness Clinic in a room adjacent to the fellowship hall.

In mid-March 2020 everything changed — and quickly. When the City of Philadelphia declared that indoor dining was no longer allowed due to the coronavirus pandemic, the Arch Street UMC Ministry Team had to make quick decisions about how they would continue to provide food

for neighbors who were still in as much need as before the pandemic. They contacted a pool of volunteers and quickly reoriented to distributing a hot meal every Sunday night from the church's front door. No matter what the weather, the program has continued almost every Sunday evening.

In Fall 2020 the nurses decided that they should restart the Wellness Center. They solicited the Grace Cafe Team's input and help coordinating, and they decided that the nurses could provide

consultations, blood-pressure and blood-glucose checks, and even flu vaccines in a small, outdoor tent. Since a pressing need of many homeless people is basic health supplies (soap, shampoo, toothbrush/toothpaste, etc.) and personal items (socks, hand warmers in the winter, hand sanitizer, masks, etc.), they also coordinated volunteers to distribute such items.

Jay R. Newlin, Past Grand Regent of Pennsylvania and Past Regent of Integrity Council, has been a regular volunteer with Grace Cafe throughout the pandemic. Some weeks he helps to distribute the hot meals. Other weeks he volunteers with the nurses, distributing health supplies and personal items. ### WHAT EMPLOYEES NEED IN TIMES OF CRISIS

The COVID-19 pandemic may be receding, but the

next crisis is just around the corner. You need your workforce in your corner to survive and thrive, whatever problem you're up against. The MIT Sloan Management Review spells out what employees are looking for from their leaders in tumultuous times:



• Provide current information. Employees want to know what's going on, and they want to hear it from their own managers, not news sites and social media. Keep your workforce updated with good news and bad news alike, from top leaders to line managers closest to employees. This will build trust and confidence in your leadership.

• Pay attention to workers. Employees want to

feel seen and heard. Managers shouldn't hide in their offices—they should be out with their employees, answering questions and listening to their concerns. Give them credit for good work, and help them when they need assistance.

• Keep people focused. Tell

employees what your priorities are so they can concentrate on the work that will keep your organization healthy and on track. This includes news of what's happening in your industry as a whole, not just your own organization. Let them know it's normal to be nervous, and make sure they feel empowered to do whatever they can to keep things running smoothly.

### **DONALD E. FERRY SPIRIT OF SERVICE AWARD**

This program of tribute is to memorialize Donald E. Ferry, Jr. - Home Office Customer Service Specialist with 29 years of service and member of the Supreme Council Junior Committee for 22 years. Donald passed away in November 2020 but his legacy of service to our Society will be carried forth in the fraternal work and fellowship shared by the Royal Arcanum Family.

With allegiance to our founding attribute of Charity and his dedicated efforts for the success of the Society's Junior Department and its programs, Donald's willingness to

create fraternal projects and lead by example was witnessed in the Royal Arcanum for over a quarter century.

The Supreme Council instituted the Donald E. Ferry Jr. Spirit of Service Memorial Award in recognition and remembrance of the inspiring and selfless dedication Donald had for the Royal Arcanum.

The program's purpose is to "See a Need and Take the Lead" in support of a children's charity or charitable program for the benefit of children.

Through this Supreme Council initiative, Royal Arcanians can follow in Donald's footsteps of fraternal service by creating a project for youth.

Councils are encouraged to be as creative as they wish and to welcome the participation of Junior Arcanians and support of friends and prospective members to fulfill their project goal(s).

Subordinate councils (current in filing reports to Boston) are invited to participate.

The charity being supported is to be determined by members of the council.

Each year one project will be selected as the winner by a panel of independent judges and the sponsoring Royal Arcanum council will receive a \$500 award for its use.



#### — GUIDELINES —

Subordinate Councils are invited to sponsor a volunteer project for a children's charity or charitable cause for the benefit of children during the period of:

June 1st
[International Children's Day]
through
November 20th
[Family Volunteer Day]

Councils will select the charity and tailor

their project as they desire.

The project chosen by the Council should be one that best

exemplifies how members saw a need and took the lead as fraternalists volunteering together to leave a positive imprint on the lives of children.

Councils must be the organizing unit and sponsor of the activity/project.

Solely monetary donations made to a charity are not eligible for the award program.

The Council Secretary is to

complete the Donald E. Ferry Spirit of Service Memorial Award Application (Form DEFsa-I) and compile all project-related materials (purpose of project, description, impact on children, signatures, photos, acknowledgments, etc.) that are to be included with the application submission.

All materials MUST be packaged together and forwarded to:

Completed applications must be received on or before December 6th.

Each eligible Subordinate Council may submit one project annually.

### TROUBLE BREATHING? THIS MAY BE THE CAUSE

Shortness of breath can be a terrifying condition, especially after a year of COVID-19. It has many

possible causes, though. Don't panic, but do seek medical attention. The Medical News Today website points to these common causes of breathing difficulty:

• Anxiety. Anxiety can cause muscle tension, rapid heartbeat, agitation, and other symptoms which can lead to shortness of breath. This can be treated with therapy and/or medication, along with meditation and other mindfulness techniques.


• **Asthma.** Symptoms include wheezing, coughing, and mild chest pain. It can be triggered by tobacco, dust mites, pollen, exercise, and other factors. It doesn't always require medical treatment, but doctors can prescribe bronchodilators or anti-inflammatory medication in severe cases.

• **Obesity.** Carrying excess weight or body fat can have a negative impact on overall health, including

breathing. Obesity can also be a factor in acne, excess body hair, skin tags, and dermatitis. People with obesity can work with a doctor to establish a healthy, balanced diet and lose weight safely.

• Heart arrhythmia. This is a condition where your heart has an irregular rhythm. You may not experience any symptoms, although some people suffer from a rapid heartbeat, low blood pressure, tightness in the

chest, or a temporary loss of consciousness. Your doctor may prescribe medication or, in some cases, implant a pacemaker or a cardioverter-defibrillator.



### **SUPPORT FOR COMMUNITY SHELTERS**

Members of New Jersey's Versatility Council #2501 conducted a springtime project for area shelters to aid in the mission of providing help and support to the hungry, hurting and poor. The fraternalists contributed an abundance of useful items that filled vans to their brims for deliveries to Newark and Jersey City.

The Mercy House, a program under the Archdiocese of Newark, seeks to provide a welcoming space for individuals and families in need as well as emotional support and healing. The effects of the pandemic had a profound impact on the community. Many places had to close, supplies were depleted and needs were great. Requests for food, clothing, household goods, kitchenware and children's items undoubtedly increased during the past year.

The Arcanians reached out to family and friends to participate in the fraternal effort and were busy during the month of April sorting and packing the tremendous amount of donations that were received.

Another stop was made at St. Lucy's Shelter in Jersey City. Operated by Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Newark, St. Lucy's is a shelter for single men and women that offers emergency housing and food for those in need. Cartons of new and gently used clothing articles and shoes were delivered, along with an abundant supply of shower and personal hygiene products.

The donations were greatly appreciated by volunteers and staff at the shelters. They would provide comfort and confidence to the people who seek assistance during times of challenge and uncertainty.

The council's Charitable Service Committee plans to continue sponsoring similar projects in the hope that healthy and happy futures will be realized for those who are suffering and in need.

holiday is anticipated with great expectation and joy!







### **BAKER'S NOOK**

Similar to pound cake, this recipe is from my mom and it was the first thing I baked when I was just 12 years old in Italy. After many years, it's still something simple that I enjoy baking. Today, my children call it "Nonna's Panettone". I hope that you and your family will like it, too!

### **Panettone**

Dry Ingredients, mixed together:

3 cups flour

3 teaspoons baking powder

Pinch of salt

I large lemon, grated

Wet Ingredients:

3 extra-large eggs (or 4 medium)

I cup sugar

I cup vegetable oil

I cup milk

I teaspoon lemon extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

With a mixer, beat the eggs and sugar for two minutes. Next, add the oil and lemon extract, mixing well. Then add the dry ingredients, alternating with the milk, a little at a time.

Pour the batter into a greased and floured round baking pan or Bundt pan and bake for 40 to 55 minutes (depending on the oven.) Before baking, you can sprinkle the top of the batter with sugar mixed with cinnamon and finely chopped nuts (optional.)

### **CHIEF OPERATIONS OFFICER CORNER**

As I write this message in the Boston Home Office, it's great to see some level of normalcy returning in the Northeast. The summer is in full swing with a much higher rate of people out and about in Boston. I'm seeing many more tourists in the area when I'm coming and going from the office. Plus the morning traffic is back! We have made some significant strides against COVID, which - if individuals are being diligent - I hope continue. As difficult as COVID was, we thought outside the box as an insurance operation and our approach to the unprecedented situation will have a lasting impact on us. We now have an increased ability to operate remotely with Home Office associates being able to process tasks from home while maintaining the same level of member service experience. This is pivotal especially for the winter when we can always expect a few days of blizzard-like conditions to make it less than ideal to travel.

of 25% of surplus in the stock market. If H1164 is approved, the law will be amended to allow 10% of assets to be invested. Our current bill has the same parameters as the previous bill and it is in line with many other states throughout the United States.



Lastly, I was fortunate to have Junior Director Errica Conforto allow me to notify the college scholarship recipients this year. It's certainly an enjoyable moment to advise a high school graduate that they have won a college scholarship from Royal Arcanum.



Our staff continues to work in a hybrid capacity, working in the Home Office as well as remotely. However we now have 70-75% of the staff on-site during business hours. The most important objective is the health and safety of our staff, as well as ensuring we are operating at high service levels and completing tasks within the established cycle times. We continue to see increased life insurance sales after an increase in first year premium & renewal premiums in 2020. In 2020 we saw an increase in application volume by over 20% compared to 2019 and have seen continued increases of 5% during the first half of 2021 as compared to 2020.

The Massachusetts Fraternal Investment Bill H 1164 has been filed again in hopes of amending an outdated law in Massachusetts. Our previously filed bill was stalled in the legislature, mainly due to COVID. The law restricts fraternal societies from investing a maximum

### **GENETICALLY MODIFIED MOSQUITOS FIGHT DISEASE**

It sounds like the plot of a sci-fi disaster movie, but it's happening in real life:
Genetically modified mosquitoes have been released in Florida in an effort to combat an invasive species spreading disease. What could go wrong?

The Science News website reports that biotech company Oxitech bred the male mosquitoes and placed eggs in hexagonal boxes on private properties in suburban locations in April 2021. In May, monitors on the boxes showed that mature mosquitoes had flown off to start mating with females.

The males possess genetic add-ons that prevent female larvae from developing after mating. Males, however, will carry the same genetic trait.

The project is designed to prevent the spread of dengue and Zika from a recent invasive species, Ae.

Albopictus. After initial tests, Oxitech plans bigger releases to examine how well males fare and whether pest numbers decline. Oxitech may release up to 20 million mosquitoes in more tests during the fall.


Her "parents" were famous mechanics, so they


indications that many of our subordinate councils are beginning to schedule in person meetings.


