

IT'S HARD TO MAKE FRIENDS

Here's some sad news: the average American hasn't made a new friend in five years, according to a survey of 2,000 adults by OnePoll, reported on the Sputnik News website. Forty-five percent of respondents said they struggle to make new friends.

Thirty percent said they have trouble finding new friends because they don't like going to bars. About 33% said they're worried everyone already has a well-established circle of friendships, and 29% said their hobbies aren't good for making friends. Twenty-one percent said moving to a new city had made it difficult to forge new connections.

> Age may be a factor. A majority of participants felt that making friends was much easier in their early 20s. Most said they had the largest circle of friends at 23. The survey noted that the average U.S. adult has 16

active friendships.

KNOWING AND RECOGNIZING STROKES

What is a stroke? Also called a "brain attack," it's when blood to an area of the brain is blocked, or


when there's sudden bleeding in the brain. Someone suffers a stroke every 40 seconds in the United States, according to the NBC News website. The website describes two different kinds of strokes that can occur:

• Ischemic stroke. This is caused by a blood clot or plaque blocking a blood vessel in the brain.

• Hemorrhagic stroke. This is the result of a blood vessel bursting and bleeding into the brain.

The main causes of a stroke, according to the CDC, are high blood pressure, high cholesterol, smoking,

obesity, and diabetes. How can you tell if someone is having a stroke? Remember the acronym FAST:



F: Face. The face of a person having a stroke usually droops. Ask the person to smile. If the smile is uneven, a stroke could be happening.

A: Arms. Ask the person to lift one or both arms above the head. A weak or numb arm is another symptom of stroke.

S: Speech. Is the person slurring his or her words, unable to speak, or difficult to understand?

T:Time to call 911. If the person exhibits any of these symptoms, call for medical help immediately.

SATURN BEATS OUT JUPITER FOR THE MOST MOONS

Move over, Jupiter. Twenty new moons have been discovered orbiting the ringed planet Saturn, bringing its total number of moons to 82. Jupiter, formerly

believed to be the planet with the most moons in our solar system, has **79**.

The BBC News website reports that the moons, discovered by the Subaru telescope on

Maunakea, Hawaii, are about three miles in diameter. Seven of them orbit Saturn "backwards"—in the reverse direction of the planet's rotation. Those moons take more than three years to complete an orbit around the gas giant, while two of the moons in the more common "prograde" orbit take just two years. Scientists believe the moons are remnants of at least three larger bodies that were broken up by collisions between other moons or with passing asteroids.

Planet Saturn

"Studying the orbits of these moons can reveal their

origins, as well as information about the conditions surrounding Saturn at the time of its formation," says Dr. Scott Sheppard from the Carnegie Institution for Science in Washington D.C., leader of the team responsible for the discovery.

• Circular saws. Tabitha Babbit, a weaver in a Shaker community, suggested that instead of a twoman pit saw that worked only when being pulled forward, a circular saw would be more efficient. She attached a prototype to her spinning wheel in 1813 and filed a patent thereafter.

Another woman, Charlotte Bridgwood, invented an automatic version in 1917, but it wasn't accepted either. 





CROSTATA RECIPE

We are happy to share a recipe for a delicious pastry, compliments of Supreme Vice Regent Maria DiBartolo. Enjoy this dessert with family and friends!

Crostata alla Nutella Tart

3 eggs 1 cup sugar 3 cups all purpose flour 1-1/2 sticks of butter, softened 1 tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp lemon zest 1 tsp vanilla extract Nutella or preserves

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees.

Beat eggs, sugar, butter and vanilla together. Add flour, baking powder and lemon zest. Flour your hands (dough is sticky). Spread dough in a baking sheet and build a small wall as a perimeter. Fill with Nutella or preserves of your choice.

Bake on middle rack until edge is golden brown; 25-30 minutes. Remove from oven. Cool and serve.



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A WORD FROM THE SUPREME SECRETARY

I take this opportunity to wish all our members in the US and Canada a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year. As we begin a new decade we also celebrate the 143rd year of the Royal Arcanum; this is a great tribute to our membership and to the fundamentals on which our Society was founded.

I recently have been involved in refinancing a mortgage on my home; with rates being at one of the lowest points in recent history, it seemed like a good opportunity to save some money.

In the process I learned some interesting facts about credit ratings and credit scores. I would like to share some of what I learned.

What is credit? Credit is money you borrow to buy goods or services and pay back at a later time, most often with interest and other fees. You receive credit when a lender reviews your credit application and credit report

and determine if they should take a financial risk based on your history. The lender needs to feel confident you will pay them back according to a schedule.

There are three basic types of credit. Revolving credit lets you charge up to a maximum credit limit. Credit cards and Home Equity Lines of Credit (HELOCs) - loans set up as a line of credit - are examples

of revolving credit. This type of credit allows you to carry a balance and make monthly payments, with interest charges. Charge cards may look like revolving cards, but the payment rules are different, requiring you to pay the total balance in full each month. Installment credit includes loans that are granted for a set amount of money with regular repayment schedule over a set time frame. Mortgages, auto loans, and student loans fall under this category.

Most of us are familiar with the term credit score. This is a three digit number lenders use to determine your credit worthiness. There are six core components that help



calculate your credit score. Payment history makes up about 35% of your credit score. One of the easiest ways to improve your credit score is to make sure your monthly payments are on time. Credit usage is the next most significant factor in your score. To avoid lowering your score experts suggest you use no more than 30% of your total credit card borrowing limit. Length of credit history is responsible for up to 15% of score and is a good indicator of your financial behavior. Your credit score reflects your total outstanding debt along with the types

of credit you use also known as the credit mix. Credit mix makes up 10% of the score. Credit applications also contribute up to 10% of your score. When you apply for a loan or credit card it's known as a hard inquiry. Recent applications can lower your score by a few points, but as long as you pay your bills on time, it should bounce back in a few months. Finally, while there is no percentage attached to negative information, it can severely lower

your credit score over a long period. Negative info on your report includes collections and bankruptcies.

Establishing and maintaining "good" credit is critical if you plan to use it to make major life purchases, such as a home or car. Credit information can also be used in the decision making process in other areas of life, including to secure

employment or rent an apartment.
