

from newborn to teen. The members enjoyed their holiday gathering and were happy to be Santa's helpers in making the holiday merrier for the young patients.

TEACHING YOUR CHILDREN ABOUT MONEY

One reason parents give children allowances is to help them learn how to manage money. For it to be a truly effective teaching tool, though, parents should spell out what the allowance will cover, how it can be spent, the

consequences of overspending, and how much should be saved or given to charity.

Here are some guidelines:

• Encourage planning. When deciding how much the allowance should be, consider giving enough to encourage saving or charitable giving. Be careful not to give too much, though. If the kids can buy anything they want, the allowance fails to teach them how to prioritize and set goals.



- **Set up a payday.** Try choosing a day early in the week to encourage kids to plan ahead for weekend expenses.
- Set limitations and guidelines. If you don't want

them to buy things you don't want them to have, require that they consult you before making purchases over a specific amount, like \$10.

- Expect mistakes. Children will probably overspend at first. Don't get angry. Help the child correct his or her mistakes and learn from them.
- Don't link the allowance to chores. If allowance is "payment" for chores, children can too easily decide to skip their chores and accept not getting any allowance, which defeats the purpose.

WHAT MAKES OLD FAITHFUL SO FAITHFUL?

Yellowstone Park's Old Faithful geyser erupts every 90 minutes, sending water and steam high into the air to the delight of spectators. According to the Science Magazine website, geophysicists have identified the origin of all that water. Listening to natural vibrations (instead of relying on seismic waves produced



by explosives that would damage the park's environment), the scientists discovered a region of porous rock 200 meters across and 50 meters deep slightly to the west of the geyser. The underground tank contains hundreds of millions of liters of water heated by magma, so there's no chance of Old Faithful running dry soon.



EVEN CATS GET THE BLUES

If the cold weather, lack of sunshine, and short days of February have you feeling out of sorts, imagine the havoc it's playing on the lives of our animal companions. Confined indoors and longing to feel the earth beneath their paws and a gentle breeze ruffling their fur, our pets can get depressed and a bit stir crazy this time of year.

Talk to your vet if you notice changes in your pet's eating, activity, and sleeping habits to rule out the possibility of an illness. Be on the lookout for an increase in destructive behaviors such as



chewing and scratching that can be an indication of boredom or anxiety. The same holds true for repetitive behaviors such as excessive meowing or barking.

If your pets are otherwise healthy, a little extra attention may help to alleviate their winter doldrums. Introduce a new toy into the mix or add a few extra minutes of playtime to their daily routine to help them stay stimulated and active. Consider baking up a batch of natural dog biscuits or growing a patch of cat grass to give pets a treat that will show them that you're thinking of their well-being.

HELP SOMEBODY

While he was serving in the Navy during World War II, an unfortunate accident resulted in the death of several of Thomas Cannon's shipmates. Because Cannon's life was spared, he felt a duty and purpose to be in the service of

others.

Over 33 years, Cannon gave away over \$150,000. He made donations to people in his hometown of Richmond, Virginia; most of them had been profiled in the local newspaper. He'd often mail \$1,000 checks to the staff of the paper with instructions

about who should receive the money. His charity helped support a local group that volunteered in the elementary school, a woman who started a youth center in her low-income neighborhood, and an

orphaned teen who was active in his community. Cannon never owned a fancy house or drove a flashy car. His \$20,000-a-year salary as a postal worker allowed him to provide the necessities for his wife and sons, while his generous spirit

> inspired him to help others who were not as fortunate.

Though his benevolence garnered him a certain amount of accolades, Cannon made it clear that he didn't want the bureaucracy of a foundation to carry on his work, nor to have his name commemorated in any way once he was no longer living. Cannon suggested the best way to honor his memory would be for others to just "Help somebody."

To foster an atmosphere of harmony at your next family event, try these tactics ...



To foster an atmosphere of harmony at your next family event, try these tactics:

- Establish rules. No one wants to hear a debate about politics or religion at Nana's 98th birthday party. 
Dear Sisters and Brothers,



A WORD FROM THE SUPREME SECRETARY

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all our members in the US and Canada a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year. This year begins the I4Ist of the Royal Arcanum, a tribute to our membership and the values on which our Society was founded: Virtue, Mercy and Charity.

As I sit here writing this article, the East Coast of the US has just suffered through a Bomb/ Cyclone weather event. I'm not sure exactly what this means, I know that we have had snow, blizzard like conditions and wind chill readings up to minus 25 degrees. Subfreezing temperatures have gone on for

almost two weeks. Like most of us, I am looking forward to Spring.

Whatever your position on climate change or global warming, natural occurrence or man made, I think we can

all agree that as stewards of this planet we all have the responsibility to do our part in protecting our environment. I did some research using the NASA website regarding Global Climate Change. The information was both fascinating and frightening. Some of the data presented under the evidence section is as follows: the Earth's climate has changed throughout history. In the last 650,000 years there have been

seven cycles of glacial advance and retreat, with the abrupt end of the last ice age about 7000 years ago marking the beginning of the modern climate era and of human civilization. Most of these climate changes are attributed to very small variations in Earth's orbit that change the amount of solar energy our planet receives.

The current warming trend is of particular significance because most of it is extremely likely (greater than 95% probability) to be the result of human activity since mid-20th century and proceeding at a rate that is unprecedented over decades to millennia.

Earth orbiting satellites and other technological advances have enabled scientists to see the big picture, collecting many different types of information about our planet and its climate on a global scale. This body of data, collected over many years, reveals the signals of a changing climate.



The planet's average surface temperature has risen about 2.0 degrees Fahrenheit (1.1 degrees Celsius) since the late 19th century, a change driven largely by increased carbon dioxide and other human-made emissions into the atmosphere. Most of the warming has occurred in the past 35 years, with 16 of the 17 warmest years on record occurring since 2001. Not only was 2016 the warmest year on record, but eight of 12 months that make up the year from January through September, with the exception of June - were the warmest on record for those months.

The data that I listed just scratches the surface of the info on climate change that appears on the NASA website regarding this subject. In addition to evidence it lists causes, effects, scientific concensus and vital signs. As a footnote, while I was writing this article, I came across a

related article in our local paper reporting that weather related disasters cost the US \$306 billion (yes billion) in 2017. The NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration) listed 16 disasters exceeding a billion dollars each, the most expensive being hurricanes Harvey (Texas) \$125 billion, Maria (Puerto Rico) \$90 billion, and Irma (Florida) \$50 billion. Western wildfires added \$18 billion to the total. The agency

also reported that 2017 was the third hottest year in US records for the lower 48 states with an annual temperature of 54.6 degrees – 2.6 degrees warmer than the 20th century average.

I believe the evidence suggests that climate change is factual. The website lists some simple steps that we can all take to lessen the impact of climate change. I would suggest taking a look at the website and come to your own conclusions. Stay warm.


