Gardening is an excellent way to relieve stress, and there are several reasons why it works so well for calming the mind and body:





Feeding the pigeons is one of the earliest memories of time happily spent with my paternal grandfather. I fondly recall stopping at the local grocery shop where he'd purchase a sack of peanuts before we headed off to the county park. As a toddler it was a big thrill for me to hold my hand open to nest the treats while my grandfather did the shelling. Within a matter of seconds, a flock descended, strutting about while bobbing their heads and with expectations of getting a nibble or two. We were ready for them and the "simple activity" created a fun time (for us and I think for the pigeons, too!). Always evolving to provide the best as a fraternal insurer for families, the Royal Arcanum's financial products of permanent life insurance plans and annuity options, member benefits, charitable support and volunteer service initiatives indicate that the organization has stood the test of time. We have a great message that can be delivered to our families and friends to introduce them

Recently I was looking over photos taken during vacations and was amazed to see how many times I've captured pigeons on camera! From town squares in European cities to fountains in stately gardens to peaks of lofty landmarks, pigeons may be found to the delight or dismay of the traveler. (I'm in the first group.)

Long wings and powerful flight muscles make pigeons strong, swift fliers. The homing pigeon is selectively bred for its ability to find its way



home over extremely long distances and because of this skill, homing pigeons were used to carry messages. When used during wars, they were called "war pigeons" and they have been credited for their gallantry and bravery in saving human lives with their actions. During World War II, homing pigeons were airdropped into northwest Europe to serve as intelligence vectors for local resistance agents. They had a crucial function in the Invasion of Normandy; radios could not be used for fear of vital information being intercepted by the enemy. Throughout history, whether they flew a few yards or hundreds of miles, homing pigeons were reliable and effective couriers.

In a few weeks, our fraternal benefit society will begin its 148th year of service to members and to communities.

Advancing our Society's mission of service and dedication to its founding attributes of Virtue, Mercy, and Charity continues to be demonstrated by the Royal Arcanum's good work. Whether giving support to a local charity or helping volunteers who are thousands of miles from home, members and councils are messengers of hope and good will, making a positive difference for others each and every day!

Supreme Regent Nicole Covelli presents a great opportunity for us to promote the Royal Arcanum and be fraternal messengers in community this year by participating in her campaign's "Book Drive". It's an ideal way to help children

TEACHING OUR CHILD

Teaching your kids responsibility is an essential part of their development and sets them up for success in the future. Here are some effective ways to teach responsibility to your children:

I. Model Responsibility

Kids learn a lot by observing their parents, so be a role model. Show them how you handle tasks, commitments, and challenges. When they see you taking responsibility in your daily life, they're more likely to do the same.

BAKER'S BOX: ORANGE CRANBERRY BISCOTTI WITH PISTACHIO

Enjoy this recipe submitted by Past Supreme Regent Errica Conforto. The classic confection is a complement to any meal or as a stand-alone treat!

Ingredients :

2 cups flour
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 large eggs
1/3 cup unsalted butter, melted
zest of 2 oranges
1 cup dried cranberries
1 cup shelled pistachios, chopped



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. [Baking time 25-30 minutes, plus 8-10 additional minutes after the biscotti are cut].

In a large bowl, whisk together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt.

In a separate bowl, beat eggs and then add the melted butter and the orange zest. Mix well. Gradually add the wet ingredients to the dry, stirring until just combined. Fold in cranberries and chopped pistachios until evenly distributed in the dough.

Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper.

Divide dough in half. Shape each piece into a 12×2 -inch log. (Dough may be sticky; dust hands with flour to handle more easily.)

Place each log on a cookie sheet and bake in the preheated oven until logs are light brown (25-30 minutes).

Remove from oven and set aside to cool for 10 minutes. Cut logs into thick slices. (An electric knife works well). Place cookies cut-side down on the cookie sheet and return to the oven to bake until dry, 8 to 10 minutes more. Then remove from oven. Cool. Enjoy!


Every year our organization awards more than \$65,000 in scholarships and grants to the eligible winners to help our members spring forward with their education. I hope that our Junior members




